Mrs. Maria (Ines) Couchot, SHS aid, has recently become a U.S citizen after living here for 32 years. She came to the United States as an exchange student program from Mexico when she was 18 years old. She was already a high school graduate, but didn't know any English and wanted to study the language. She had planned on going to California to study and stay with a host family, but a family death occurred in her exchange family, so she wasn't able to go to California. She was able to find another family in Ohio. The Valentine family took her in so she could study. She went to Sidney High School as a senior. After she graduated from SHS, she went back to Mexico. She said she really enjoyed coming to SHS. While she was at school, she started dating her future husband, Steve. Six months after graduation, Steve went to Mexico and proposed to her. They later got married and stayed in Sidney. They had 3 kids: Jon, Denyse, and Cristina, who are all biligual. She also has 3 grandchildren.

According to Mrs. Couchot, the process of getting her citizenship took 4 months. The first step is filling out a 10 page application. Next, after your application is accepted, they schedule an interview in Columbus. The third step involves the interview and a test that was taken in Cincinnati. After successfully completing all parts of the process, the applicant is asked to take a nationalization oath. Maria and her sister Marissa applied for citizenship together. She also said the reason it took her 32 years to become a citizenship was because she wanted to keep her Mexican citizenship. She wanted to keep it because it was the only thing she had left of her heritage. The decision to apply for US citizenship came about when a recent law was passed that allows an individual to have dual citizenships.

What is Teacher Academy?

Teacher academy is a program for seniors only offered at the Upper Valley JVS. The program is for students that are interested in the career field of education. Teacher Academy offers a morning and an afternoon class, each for two and a half hours.

What are the Benefits of Teacher Academy?

There are a lot of benefits to the Teacher Academy program. One of which is the internships. Throughout the year, three days a week, students intern in different schools around the area. Being in a classroom for your studies really gives you an idea whether or not teaching is really for you and which area of teaching you might be interested in. The course is like a dual enrollment class. At the end of the year, you are granted three high school credits and three college credit hours (as long as you pass). Also, once you pass, you are eligible for a 50% scholarship to Edison Community College for two years. On top of internships, you get to attend conferences, seminars, and competitions for the Future Educators Association.

What are the requirements for Teacher Academy?

To get into the Teacher Academy Program, you have to be a senior with at least a 2.5 GPA and a 95% attendance rate. You also have to be on a college prep/AP path, and on track to graduate. Last but not least, you have to be in a math class your senior year.

What is genre?

Genre, according to dictionary.reference.com, is “a class or category of artistic endeavor having a particular form, content, technique, or the like.” Genre is very important in all artistic fields. The one that most people probably know of is the different music genres. R&B, hip-hop, hard rock, soft rock, country, and so on. Literary genres are different from music genres. But as with music genres, everyone has his/her favorite genre of literature. When you go to the movies, you either prefer a comedy, action, romance, tragedy, or a combination. Just like when you go to the library, you always go to a certain section to find the right book. If you don’t, you might need an explanation of what types of genre are out there that would match what you like.

There are two main genres within the literary world. They are nonfiction and fiction. Nonfiction is based on facts while fiction is not real. It can be somewhat confusing when you first learn it. A way to remember is “non.” Non is a Latin suffix that means “not” and fiction is derived from “fictum,” which means “to create.” So, nonfiction is a story you don’t create but only write down while fiction is a story that you create from your imagination. These two genres can be further broken down.

Nonfiction Forms

- * **Biography**- a book written about a person’s life based on known facts.
- * **Autobiography**- a book written by a person about said person’s life.
- * **Diary**- similar to an autobiography but an entry is written in everyday
- * **Journal**- similar to diary, but less frequent.
- * **Essay**- can be broken down into different types of essays. Informative gives the reader information, critical is somewhat of a review and opinion is a person’s opinion on a matter. Nearly all essays require a bibliography, which is a section where quotes and information are cited.

Fiction Forms

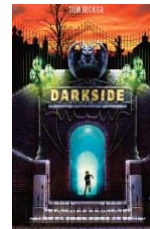
- * **Adventure**- Adventure has a lot of action, fighting. Normally it has a quest in it and it can be very dangerous.
- * **Fantasy**- fantasy has fantastical creatures, details, and characters. Normally, fantasy, adventure, and romance go hand-in-hand.
- * **Horror**- a story that is written to scare or unsettle the audience. Best horror stories also have suspense in them. Gothic fiction is synonymous.
- * **Mystery**- a story full of suspense where a detective solves a crime. A well-known collection of short stories is that of Sherlock Holmes.
- * **Fairy tale/Fable/Folklore**-stories that are passed down through the ages that tend to fantastic creatures and literature. Older versions of fantasy.
- * **Romance**- a story that is basically about how two people meet and fall in love. Happy endings are a must (most of the time).
- * **Tragedy**- a story with a sad ending, causing the audience to feel sympathy for the characters.
- * **Historical**- stories written in somewhat of a dramatic fashion during a historical period in time.

Of course, in literature the genres can be mixed, combined, and matched until the author’s needs are met. Normally, though, there is one dominant genre with multiple others mixed in. Finding which one a person wants is simple. Look for what you are interested in. If you enjoy adventure movies or activities, that might just be the genre for you.

Knowing your genres will help you pick out a book for book projects, or maybe a book to read for fun. If you don’t like romance, you don’t want to pick one up and start to read it, after all. Next time you go to the library, make sure you find the genre that best suits you.

Darkside and *Darkside: Lifblood* are two books in a series by Tom Becker. The third book is called *Nighttrap* that the library did not currently have in its possession. I will be reviewing the first two in the series. Both are easy reads, only took me a day to read each one.

The story is captivating and very suspenseful with the idea of there being a hidden world designed to separate the “bad” people from the “good” people. The use of different types of creatures and creepers is successful in creating the contrast between the “Lightside” and the “Darkside.” The characters are fun and amusing, even if some of the things are somewhat cheesy.

The plot is a good one for its reading level. A boy named Ricky is being kidnapped, another boy named Johnathon is escaping from being kidnapped and trying to figure out what’s going on. Then, Johnathon’s ill father sends him to Darkside to meet with an old friend of his, Carnegie. Together the two attempt to figure out why someone’s trying to kidnap Johnathon as well as deal with a vampire on their heels. There’s enough twists and turns in the story to keep you on the edge of your seat.

The second plot is another good one and a good follow-up to *Darkside*. This one is about figuring out who killed a Ripper, AKA descendants of Jack the Ripper and the family that rules Darkside. It delves into the society within Darkside and brings some light to Johnathon’s mother. It’s also full of twists like the first one is. Sometimes you think you know who did it but are completely wrong.

All in all, these two books are worth the grab as long as you pick up the first book before the second book. Otherwise, it gets a bit confusing. These two books are wonderful mystery fantasies that make a dull day into an adventure into the unknown. So, check out this new series by Tom Becker.

Shenanigans

Shenanigans was released by Green Day in 2002, and it is a compilation of songs from other than their other albums. There is only one new song, titled "Ha Ha Your Dead," and it is the last song on the album. There are a total of 14 songs, and the whole album is only 33 minutes long. There is one instrumental song, title "Espionage," that is pretty much the perfect song to play in the back of a James Bond movie. Other than that, there are such songs as "Desensitized," "Sick of Me," "Tired of Waiting for You," and "You Lied." "Desensitized," in the recording, starts off with one of the members of the band in a room, throwing furniture around, yelling through it all. MARCH MADNESS IS HERE AGAIN!

It's that time again and this year 65 teams made the cut, with 31 of them receiving automatic bids for winning their conference championship. The other 34 teams were chosen by the NCAA selection committee based on team rankings, wins-losses, and RPI (rating percentage index) data. The number one seeds this year are UConn, Louisville, North Carolina, and Pitt. Since 1939 when it was introduced, the Final Four has become one of the most prominent sporting events in the nation. Billions of people around the world watch the games, bet on them, and try to determine who will make it to the championship game. Most would say this is impossible though, with the odds of picking the perfect bracket 9.2 quintillion to 1. This is because there are 9, 223, 372, 036, 854, 775, 808 or 9.2 quintillion possibilities for the bracket to come out.

March Madness began March 17, with Alabama State and Morehead State playing the opening round game to determine who will get the 16th seed against Louisville. The opening round game started in 2001 and since then has been played at UD Arena in Dayton. The first and second rounds are March 19-22, and they will be played in Greensboro, Kansas City, Philadelphia, Portland, Boise, Dayton, Miami, and Minneapolis. The sweet sixteen and elite eight are March 26-29, and they will be played in Boston, Glendale, Indianapolis, and Memphis. This year the Final Four will be played at Ford Field in Detroit on Saturday April 4. The championship game will be played on April 6, also in Detroit.

The top three most winning teams are UCLA with eleven national titles, Kentucky with seven national titles, and Indiana University with five national titles. There have only been six teams seeded number one that went on to win the championship. They are North Carolina in 1982, Duke in 1992, UCLA in 1995, Michigan State in 2000, Duke in 2001, and Florida in 2007. There has only been one time when all four number one seeded teams made it to the Final Four, and that was last year when Kansas, North Carolina, Memphis, and UCLA. The past five years the champions have been Kansas, Florida, Florida, North Carolina, and UConn.
