The Berlin Wall goes back up

The Berlin wall is up in German class at Sidney High School. In German II, taught by Mr. Mike Keiser, a "wall" is put up in the classroom to simulate the Berlin Wall so the students actually get a feel for how the Germans felt during the Cold War.

In Germany, the large concrete structure divided Berlin into a East and West territory that also separated Germany. The East side was influenced by the communist Soviet Union Russia, and the West side was backed up by the capitalist western allies: France, Great Britain, and the United States. The SHS simulated wall is actually just tape on the ground and painted sheets, protesting communism. This signifies the boundary for the east and the

west side of Berlin.

Those who experienced living in Germany at this time would have been shot for crossing the barrier. In class, if you cross the tape or you do anything that would violate the code of the wall the student is given a card, indicating that they would have been shot. The card gets whole punched taking one point out of the twenty point grade the student gets for this assignment. At the end of the simulation, the students on the East side get their points back. The class activity goes on for two weeks.

This simulation is very important to the students because it gives them a feel for how conditions of the time and area were while the Berlin wall was up.

Winter is here!

The winter season is back, and that means more preparation for school to run as usual. During the winter, there is salt that needs to be put down to fight ice, snow that needs to be plowed and shoveled, and heat that needs to be run during school hours. This raises prices quite a bit. This year especially, salt is a very big part of the equation. At an average amount of 14.7 tons used a year it adds up. However, last year, the school used a whopping 73.5 tons! The number fluctuates with the type of winter we face. Mr. Bill Ankney, manager of business operations for SCS said, "We buy 50% of our historical usage to start the season and then buy as needed, in six skid increments. We have enough area to store upwards of 18 skids of bagged salt."

The school also has plow equipment for 3 trucks, so that the snow can be cleared from the roads, parking lots, sidewalks, and walkways. There are five workers that are required for the winter, two people for de-icing the sidewalks, and some of the parking lot, and three people for plowing all the snow.

The increase in costs during the winter is about 20% compared to the rest of the year. With the levy not passing, there may be some cutbacks felt here as well. Due to the rising costs of salt, which the city is facing as well, it comes as no surprise that there will be less salt and de-icer laid out on the parking lot.

Throughout the city as well as the school parking lot, the danger of slippery conditions will need to be taken into consideration. Mr. Ankney reminds us to "Wear proper shoes for slippery conditions to reduce the risk of falling on hard surfaces. Most of us don't bounce very well when we hit the ground!"

Everyone needs to remember to "slow down", especially in the parking lot. With the decreased bussing there will be more cars out in the parking lot and everyone will have to pay more attention.

Deer season is here!

Get your hunting gear ready because deer season here! There are about four different kinds of hunting allowed in Ohio regarding deer season, bow and arrow, muzzleloader, youth season, and the regular season. Hunting season, for deer at least, started on September 27th and goes through February 1st, depending on what you are hunting with. Muzzle loader season, in certain areas, started

October 20th- 25th. Youth gun season, involving anyone under the age of 17, starts November 22-23. While the regular gun season starts December 1st. Hunters who do not get a deer can also go out during the extended season December 20th-21st.

Some gear a hunter might want to invest in for this season would be some really warm clothes, plenty of ammunition

and a hunter's license which can be purchased at various places throughout Ohio. You can find out by going to <http://www.dnr.state.oh.us/wildlife/dow/regulations/vendor.aspx> or ordering online also. Licenses cost \$10 for youth 10 and under and seniors ages 65-70, and adult licenses cost \$19. Licenses for individuals over the age of 70 are free. Hunters also need additional permits based on the type of game they are hunting. These costs are for Ohio residents of 6 months or longer. Out-of-state resident licenses cost \$125. While gathering all of the gear, licenses, and permits, don't forget the orange hat or vest, because safety is a priority while hunting.

A person can not hunt anywhere except outside city limits and on private property. However, if it is private property, permission can be granted by the property owner. Many hunters go to southern Ohio to hunt because that is where the bag limit is higher and where the game population is higher. There are better woods and overall better hunting. One can also leave the state to hunt, but would have to have a hunting license for that state and different tags for the game that you kill.

Republican Election Results

As everyone knows, democrat Barack Obama won the presidential election on November 4th. However, there were many republicans that were elected into office right here in Shelby County. Jack Toomey of Jackson Center was re-elected commissioner with 12,893 votes, or 63.07 percent, against Yost's 7,547 votes, or 36.92 percent. Dean Kimpel, of Botkins, was elected Sheriff with 11,886 votes, or 54.79 percent, against Doug Schlagetter, of Sidney, with 9,809 votes, or 45.21 percent. Jim Jordan, of Urbana, was elected into the congress for the 4th district with 16,138 votes, and Keith Faber, of Celina, was elected into the state senate for the 12th district with 13,884 votes. Both Jordan

and Faber won by a long shot. Shelby and Miami counties were both classified as primarily republican counties.

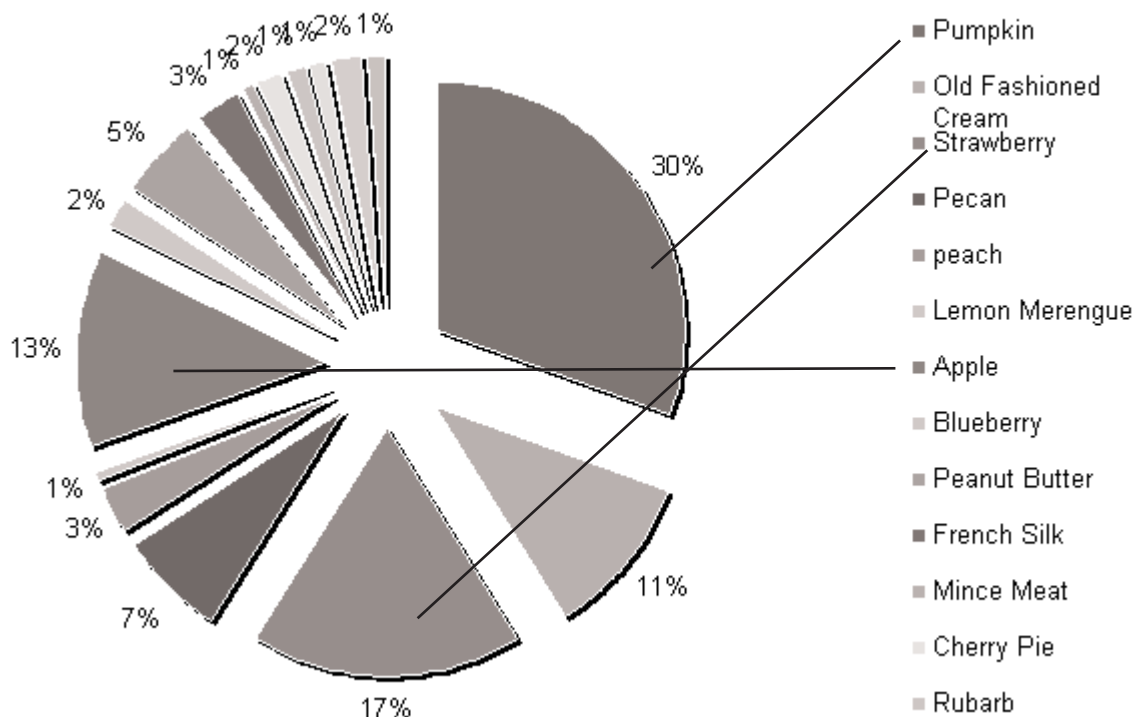

Rehearsals will be mandatory and will begin after winter break. Those who intend to be involved, plan to be at rehearsals for the first part of Spring Break (Saturday, Monday, and Tuesday) in March. The show will be performed on April 2, 3, 4, and 5.
